



The sentence builder program has been designed to work in tandem with the fight zone board game. The activities contained here are a great way for students to be aware of correct sentence structure.

Entry level

Students roll a single dice and consult the **grammar selection chart**. Students select a tile that corresponds to the colour they rolled. For instance, if the student roles a **6** they select a **blue adverb** tile. The student then places the adverb on his/her chart that matches with the blue tile. To complete the activity, students are required to fill their sentence builder chart with phrases that combine to create a grammatically complete sentence, as can be seen in the example.



The chart to the left has a completed *noun phrase*, a *verb*, a *preposition* and an *adverb* that combines to create the sentence 'My aircraft flew through the air last night.' The middle chart and the chart to the right have yet to be completed in this example.

To complete the activity, each student must complete all three sections of their chart. The sentences must be grammatically correct. If a tile does not fit with the rest of the sentence it must be returned to the coloured circle grammar pile and the student tries again next turn.

Once students have participated in this activity a number of times, they can try the **advanced** level game where they will have the opportunity of creating more interesting and complex grammatical combinations.



Advanced level

As can be seen with the above example, the various phrase types can be interchangeable. The phrases combine to create 'This morning...my plane... was flying... in the air.' Another combination with the same tiles could be... 'My plane... was flying...in the air...this morning', etc.

There are also **subordinate clause** tiles which have been included in the advanced stage so that students can experiment creating complex constructions to add extra flavour and detail to their sentences. Students can choose to add either an **adverb** or a **subordinate clause** on a dice roll of **6**.

Included at the end of this section are written language exercises which students are encouraged to write in their sentence creations after having played the game. Cut and laminate the tiles on the pages that feature the noun phrase, verbs, prepositional phrases, adverbs and subordinate clauses.

1-2	Select a verb	
3-4	Select a noun phrase	
5	Select a preposition	
6	Select an adverb (Advanced stage - add subordinate clause) Player chooses either an adverb or subordinate clause tile.	

Sentence Building Tiles

Coloured boxes guide used in this program...

noun phrase

Noun: word used to name a person, animal or thing. All nouns are combined with either an article or pronoun, 'the ship,' 'his plane' etc.

verb

Verb: a word or words that tell us what's going on in a sentence.

Example: The plane is landing on the ship.

preposition

Preposition: word used to position people and things. They often begin phrase. *On the table, with the band, in the sea.*

adverb

Adverb: Adverbs modify verbs. They tell how, when or where something happens. We rang the bell loudly yesterday.

subordinate clause

Subordinate clause: a subordinate clause is linked to the main clause and cannot exist alone. 'Before you leave for the movie, you must clean your room.'




